AGREEMENT PERIOD: July 1, 2001 – June 30, 2002

NEED:

The Pittman-Robertson Coordination Project focuses on the coordination of research, survey, and inventory projects, various development and management projects, land acquisition projects that are periodically active, and the Endangered Species Program. The extent and complexity of restoration activities involved in these projects require that general direction and coordination by technically trained and experienced personnel be provided. This project is designed to meet that need and will provide a competent project leader who will coordinate the selection, planning, and implementation of approved federal aid projects.

OBJECTIVES:

1. Coordinate the activities of the Pittman-Robertson Program in Idaho.
2. Coordinate the activities of the Pittman-Robertson Program with the other activities of the Idaho Department of Fish and Game.
3. Provide a liaison between the Department and the Division of Federal Aid.

EXPECTED RESULTS AND BENEFITS:

Enhanced coordination and communication among personnel conducting research, surveys and inventories, and land/habitat management involving federal aid funds. This will result in more effective and efficient use of available funds.

More effective and successful restoration of wildlife and wildlife habitat will be achieved through statewide coordination.

APPROACH AND ACCOMPLISHMENTS:

Review and edit annual progress reports. These reports are compared to previous segment work plans as to work accomplished.

Project documentation, budgets, and reports were completed for each Wildlife Restoration project. Office Specialist II Crystal Christensen spent considerable time editing reports turned in by field staff and preparing them for review and submittal to the

Federal Assistance office in Portland, Oregon. These reports received further review and approval by Bureau of Wildlife staff in the Boise office before being sent to Portland.

Proposed project budgets are developed in relation to overall program needs and financial capabilities.

Budgets are developed in May and June for the fiscal year (1 July – 30 June) commencing a year later. Budgets developed in May and June of 2001 for the fiscal year commencing on 1 July 2002 were adjusted, if necessary, to coincide with funds allocated to the Idaho Department of Fish and Game (Department) from the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (Service) for Wildlife Restoration projects.

Administrative adjustments were made to the contents of existing Federal Grants in order to more clearly reflect activities. Wildlife Restoration Coordination (W-168-C) was split from Statewide Wildlife Research (W-160-R). Statewide Wildlife Lab Services (W-174-R) became a separate Federal Grant (W-174-R). An additional grant was created to deal with the Tappan Ranch Land Exchange (W-178-L).

Section 6 Endangered Species Act project proposals were drafted and a meeting held with staff from the Service to arrive at mutually-agreed upon projects and proposed budgets. These proposals were then submitted to the Service for funding.

Periodic on-site reviews will be made. This will be done in conjunction with regional personnel and other staff. Reviews involve evaluation of compliance of work and checking newly-acquired areas for funding needs.

Most site reviews were conducted by the appropriate State Wildlife/Habitat Manager. Several Wildlife Management Areas and proposed land exchanges were toured during a visit by Verlyn Ebert, FA Office, Portland.

Each development project will have an annual on-site meeting in the spring to discuss current and proposed work plans and budgets and a tour of the area. Research projects will also have annual spring program discussions besides periodic reviews.

Bureau of Wildlife staff toured all the regions of the state and met with regional staff regarding work plans and allocation of time and funds. During these coordination meetings, regional staff facilitated field visits to selected projects and Wildlife Management Areas.

Principal Research Biologists convened in Boise to discuss existing and proposed research projects funded, in part, through the Wildlife Restoration Program. Proposed research projects were prioritized based on a combination of need and cost to complete.

Other activities associated with coordination and administration of the Wildlife Restoration Program within the Department and between the Department and the Division of Federal Assistance.

Melquist attended the Federal Assistance Coordinator's meeting.

Melquist met with a number of Service employees and Bill Hutchinson (Idaho Department of Fish and Game, Sport Fish Restoration Coordinator) on several occasions to discuss the Section 7 and NEPA review process as they relate to the potential impacts federally funded projects may have on listed and Candidate species. Additional meetings were held with Marilyn Hemker to further refine the process by which we evaluate our activities on listed species. This review process has added significantly to the time needed to administer the FA program.

Melquist evaluated implementation of the Department's activity-based cost accounting system, developed to allow Department staff to more accurately track their time and prevent charging ineligible activities to Federal Assistance budgets. Long-term benefits include our ability to justify and substantiate expenditures during future audits.

Dale E. Toweill became Federal Aid Coordinator after Wayne Melquist left Department employ in 2002. Crystal Christensen assumed duties of Office Specialist II when Lois Lunday retired.

FEDERAL AID IN WILDLIFE RESTORATION

The Federal Aid in Wildlife Restoration Program consists of funds from a 10% to 11% manufacturer's excise tax collected from the sale of handguns, sporting rifles, shotguns, ammunition, and archery equipment. The Federal Aid program then allots the funds back to states through a formula based on each state's geographic area and the number of paid hunting license holders in the state. The Idaho Department of Fish and Game uses the funds to help restore, conserve, manage, and enhance wild birds and mammals for the public benefit. These funds are also used to educate hunters to develop the skills, knowledge, and attitudes necessary to be responsible, ethical hunters. Seventy-five percent of the funds for this project are from Federal Aid. The other 25% comes from license-generated funds.
